**Numbers of Children  
Looked After in  
Lancashire are less  
than our statistical  
neighbours in the  
North West**



**On average more  
Children Looked After  
are getting foster  
placements in  
Lancashire than in  
England**



**Numbers of  
Children Looked  
After moving into  
permanent  
placements are  
increasing**





**More Children  
Looked After  
from a variety of  
ages are being  
adopted**

**Less than 5 out of  
100 Children  
Looked After have  
moved twice or  
more in a year**





**This is an  
improvement on last  
year and well within  
the target of less  
than 10**

**Number of Children  
Looked After in stable  
placements has not  
changed since the last  
quarter and remains  
at from 66 out of  
every 100**





**This is below Lancashire's  
target of 72**



**The number of Children  
Looked After reported  
missing has slightly declined  
from 24 to 22 of 100**



**Looked After Children achieving  
grades A\* -C in GCSEs including  
Maths and English increased from  
8% to 14% in 2014-2015**



**The number of Children  
Looked After achieving  
grades A\* -C in GCSEs  
including Maths and  
English rose from 8% in  
2013/14 to 14% in 14/15**



**This figure is slightly higher than the national average for Children Looked After achieving A\*-C at GCSE which is just under 14 out of every 100**



**Attendance in primary school  
was above target in 2013/14  
with Children Looked After  
missing 4 out of every 100  
sessions in school**



**Attendance at secondary school  
was better than last year with  
Children Looked After missing 5  
out of every 100 sessions in  
school**



**In the last year there were 52  
fixed term exclusions of  
Children Looked After – well  
below Lancashire's target of 70**





**However in the last year there were 5 permanent exclusions – a rise on last year when there were no permanent exclusions**



**According to data  
Looked After  
Children are still  
**25** times more  
likely to be  
involved with  
Youth Offending  
Teams**



**Less Children  
Looked After (88)  
have up to date  
health  
assessments than  
the previous year  
(92)**
