Consultation Document

A summary of what we are we proposing to do

This consultation document is about the split site arrangements at Ashton Community Science College, Preston.

Since January 2010 Ashton Community Science College has operated on split sites at the Ashton Campus (Aldwych Drive, Ashton-on-Ribble) and the Ribbleton Campus (Ribbleton Hall Drive, Ribbleton). The use of the Ribbleton site was approved on a temporary basis following the closure of City of Preston High School in order to accommodate pupils from that school.

The proposal is to permanently establish the split site operation of Ashton Community Science College with effect from 1 September 2013 in the following accommodation:

The Ashton Campus, which will remain the main site for pupils;

The Ribbleton Campus, which will be the main site for pupils aged 14 – 19 undertaking vocational education and training.

The county council is seeking your views on this proposal.



Foreword

Lancashire is a large, diverse authority served by some superb schools and we are committed to improving this excellence by continuing to raise standards and opportunities.

Lancashire, like many other authorities, faces challenges. Changing demographic factors mean that we must constantly review the number and location of the school places we provide. We must also respond to national policy change and to the voices of our communities.

PART ONE

Our vision and what we would like to achieve

Education is a powerful means of transforming and enriching lives and communities. Future success and well-being depends on strong creative partnerships, new ways of working, high expectations and a belief that we all have a part to play and can make a difference together.

Lancashire County Council is committed to improving the quality of educational provision to help raise standards for all learners.

Our vision also sees schools operating at the centre of their immediate and often extended communities.

Background Information

In July 2009 the Cabinet Member for Children and Schools approved the temporary operation of Ashton Community Science College on split sites from both the original Ashton Campus and the former City of Preston High School site at Ribbleton Hall Drive, Ribbleton, Preston. This was to enable the school to accommodate increased pupil numbers resulting from the City of Preston High School closure.

During the 2009/10 academic year, Ashton Community Science College consulted on proposals to alter the age range of the school from 11- 16 to 11 – 18 by adding a sixth form. In March 2010, the Cabinet Member for Children and Schools approved these proposals to take effect from 1 September 2010.

Over recent years the college has continued to develop by establishing a new vocational centre – the 'Renaissance Centre' on the Ribbleton Campus and improving accommodation for the delivery of hair and beauty and creative media studies courses. However, when the existing arrangements for the split site operation expires the college could potentially not have the accommodation to maintain the current level of provision or to further develop its vocational offer to the community.

In addition to the courses in hair and beauty and creative media studies the college is also developing courses in sport, public services, administration, business and retail. These additional courses are expected to increase the demand for places at both pre 16 and post 16 level at the college.

Intended Benefits

The Ribbleton area of Preston has high unemployment and considerable socioeconomic deprivation. It is estimated that there are around 250 young people not in education, employment or training in the Preston area, including around 70 in the Ribbleton and Brookfield wards immediately surrounding the Ribbleton campus. The development of the Renaissance Centre is intended to provide vocational learning and development opportunities for local young people and to assist with their pathway into paid employment.

On the 27th September 2012 the Cabinet Member for Children and Schools approved the proposal for Sir Tom Finney Community High School to be colocated with The Renaissance Centre on the Ribbleton Campus. In addition to providing improved accommodation for Sir Tom Finney High School, the colocation with Ashton Community Science College will provide inclusive educational and vocational opportunities to the special school pupils and assist with their transition to adulthood and independence.

A continued educational presence on the Ribbleton Campus will be a major asset for the community, in addition to providing benefits for the children and young people attending the college.

Proposal

On the 27th September 2012 the Cabinet Member for Children and Schools approved the stage 1 consultation on the permanent split site operation of Ashton Community Science College, with effect from 1 September 2013. In order to implement the proposals, further remodelling and refurbishment works will be required to provide appropriate accommodation at the Ribbleton Campus.

The Proposal

This document proposes that the operation of Ashton Community Science College on split sites at Ashton Campus (Aldwych Drive, Ashton-on-Ribble) and the Ribbleton Campus (Ribbleton Hall Drive, Ribbleton) be made permanent with effect from 1 September 2013.

If the proposal is approved there will be some remodelling and refurbishment to the Ribbleton Campus to ensure that the accommodation is suitable for the delivery of the intended vocational offer.

School Organisation and Governance Regulations

The guidelines for making prescribed alterations to schools do not place a requirement on proposers to consult in order to establish an existing school on split sites. However, the local authority is conducting statutory consultation on the proposals for the following reasons:

- there are no specific exemptions from The School Organisation (Prescribed Alterations to Maintained Schools) (England) Regulations 2007;
- the authority has previously published statutory notices containing an explanatory note that the existing split site arrangements would be temporary in nature; and
- the distance between the sites is significant at almost 4 miles.

There are 5 stages to the statutory process which must be followed:

Consultation

The issue of this document marks a period of consultation during which the views of any interested parties are sought and which will be considered before any move to the more formal stages of the process.

Publication

Dependent upon the outcome of the consultation, a decision to proceed to issue a statutory notice must be made by the Cabinet Member for Children and Schools.

Representation

Statutory notices for a prescribed alteration allow a 4 week period for anyone to submit their comments on the proposals. This enables people to express their views in the form of supporting or objecting to the proposals.


Decision


Within 2 months after the statutory notice period ends, the authority must make a decision on the proposal.

Implementation

If the proposal is approved Ashton Community Science College would operate permanently on split sites at the Ashton Campus and Ribbleton Campus with effect from 1st September 2013.
