1. Apologies

Apologies were received from Councillor Louise Edge, Children's Partnership Board - Hyndburn, Ribble Valley and Rossendale.

2. Disclosure of Pecuniary and Non-Pecuniary Interests

None were disclosed.

3. Minutes from the meeting held on 15 January 2020

Resolved: That the minutes from the meeting held on the 15 January 2020 be confirmed as an accurate record and signed by the Chair.

4. Child and Adolescent Mental Health Service (CAMHS) Redesign in Lancashire and South Cumbria

The Chair welcomed Sally Nightingale, Steven Tingle and Terry Drake, from the NHS Midlands and Lancashire Commissioning Support Unit, to the meeting.

The report presented sought to provide the Children's Services Scrutiny Committee with information on the CAMHS (Children and Adolescent Mental Health Service) redesign journey in Lancashire and South Cumbria.

Members were provided with a presentation on the redesign including the approach, what has been achieved so far and the timeline going forward.

It was reported that currently CAMHS only has half the spend in comparison to adults mental health. However, the CCG's across Lancashire have committed to a 4 year investment profile of £22.9m in 2021 rising to £26.3m in 2024. When questioned on the funding, members were advised that the funding profile would not meet the entire model at this time, and there would be a potential need to look at elements that could be implemented post 2024 unless more funding could be made available.

In response to the questions around how the county council can further support health partners in implementing the CAMHS proposed model of care, it was highlighted that there continued to be a need to look beyond the NHS funding, with more collaborative working between local authorities, health and the third sector. Members were informed that this redesign provided an opportunity to look at what could be achieved collectively to better support prevention services. In addition, it was suggested that the county council could review the high cost services currently in place to support young people at risk to identify ways that funding could be better invested through working collaboratively with health partners.

It was highlighted that one of the biggest priorities for the LEP (Lancashire Enterprise Partnership) related to adult mental health, so there was an opportunity to also look at work being undertaken within the private sector.

A question was raised in relation to the emerging issues faced in primary schools. Members were advised that although there was very good work being undertaken in some schools, there was a need to have a consistent and robust offer across all schools. It was highlighted that every school would have a link into the primary mental health offer. And to further support the offer to schools, mental health first aid training was being provided.

The committee was informed that early intervention (centring on the Primary Mental Health Work offer) would be one of the main priorities to help stem the flow of young people into CAMHS.

Members questioned the risk support area of the proposed model to further understand the provision of support to those children and young people on the edge of services. In addition, how the proposed model of care would ensure that those children and young people would be identified so they do not fall through the gaps. The committee was reassured that joint approaches between CAMHS and relevant partner agencies would be developed to enable the production of robust safety plans. However it was noted that there remains a need to identify a package of care for those children and young people who do not meet the criteria

for a mental health inpatient bed, who are unable to stay in a paediatric ward, but who are still vulnerable and require 'wrap around' support.

Members of the committee thanked all of the officers in attendance for their comprehensive presentation.

Resolved: That;

- i. The proposed model of care be considered and feedback provided.
- ii. The timescales for final agreement of the fully costed Clinical Model and Transition & Implementation Plan be noted.
- iii. A further review of the Clinical Model and Transition & Implementation Plan be provided at the end of the year.
- iv. Consideration be given by the Cabinet Member for Children, Young People and Schools to:
 - a. A review of the current county council prevention/early intervention services with a view to supporting more effective, collaborative working with partner agencies.
 - b. A review of the support currently provided across county council services to high risk children and young people, to support the identification of a package of care working with partner agencies, with a view to reducing potential duplication of services and ensuring more effective investment of funding.

5. Work Programme 2019/20

The work programme for the Children's Services Scrutiny Committee for the 2019/20 municipal year was presented.

The topics included were identified at the work planning workshop held on 22 July 2019.

Regarding the topic of Child Poverty there was a request at the last meeting for more background information on Holiday Hunger and Food Banks which is currently being produced. Relating to this topic, it was highlighted that at the External Scrutiny Committee meeting on Tuesday 25 February, there was an interesting discussion on Universal Credit which committee members may find useful. A webcast link for this meeting would be circulated to members.

There was also a request for the next meetings item on Children's Health to include information on the recently published Marmot report.

Resolved: That;

- i. The report presented be noted.
- ii. The webcast link for the External Scrutiny Committee meeting on Universal Credit, held on Tuesday 25 February, be circulated to the Children's Services Scrutiny Committee.

A new Chair for the committee would be appointed at the Full Council's AGM meeting to be held on 21 July 2020.

1. Apologies

2. Disclosure of Pecuniary and Non-Pecuniary Interests

County Councillors Peter Steen, Jennifer Mein and Joan Burrows each declared a non-pecuniary interest as they are school governors.

County Councillor Jennifer Mein further declared a non-pecuniary interest as she is a board member at Preston College.

3. Minutes of the meetings held on 30 January 2020 and 5 February 2020

Resolved: The minutes from the meetings held on 30 January 2020 and 5 February 2020 be confirmed and as an accurate record and signed by the Chair.

4. Early Years Strategy 2020- 2023

The Chair welcomed Sarah Callaghan, Director of Education and Skills and Sakthi Karunanithi, Director of Public Health to the meeting.

The report presented provided an update on the development of Lancashire's Early Years Strategy. In presenting the report, members were provided with a presentation that covered the key priorities and objectives for the Early Years Strategy, including the outcomes of each of these key priorities. A copy of the presentation can be found at Appendix 'C' of the report.

Responding to the report and presentation, the following concerns and key issues were raised by the committee:

Members' raised concerns regarding the pressures being faced by teachers, in teaching and looking after children with complex medical needs. In response, Members' were informed that by focussing on early years this should help reduce the dependency on teachers. This included additional support for Early Years Providers and around language and speech therapies.

Members' were keen to learn more about the current collaboration arrangements utilised by Lancashire County Council and different community groups. It was noted that the county council is currently in the process of setting up a network of different groups, which included schools, nurseries, community groups, health visitors, etc. to ensure support for a child was being given at a local level and in their own community. Members' requested an update on the progress of setting up the networks to come to a future meeting of the committee.

Resolved: That;

- i. The feedback provided on the report be noted; and
- ii. An update on the progress of the local networks be provided at a future meeting of the Education Scrutiny Committee.

5. Developing the Approach and Provision for Children and Young People with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities

Sarah Callaghan, Director of Education and Skills presented information setting out the actions being taken to enable the county council to fulfil its responsibilities for ensuring the sufficiency of provision for children and young people with

special educational needs and disabilities over the next five years. It was reported that the actions detailed in the report was consistent with the principles agreed by Cabinet in August 2019. A copy of the presentation is attached to the minutes.

In relation to the provision of SEND units attached to mainstream schools, Members' raised concerns about the condition of some of the existing school buildings. Members were informed that schools received a set of criteria as part of the expression of interest process which would help to establish whether the school was fit for purpose.

Members' were advised that the submissions deadline for applications was 20 March 2020 and responses back to the schools chosen was 3 April 2020. Information on the schools chosen would be shared with members at a later date.

Members' expressed concerns about the readiness of staff and ensuring that they have the necessary training and qualifications needed. It was noted that the training being provided for staff was constantly under review to establish the impact and the uptake of the training.

Commenting on the report, Members requested further information on the proposed schools locality network which was aiming to bring education and children services teams together. It was noted that to date, there had been 30 proposed locality networks, and aims for these networks to be established by September 2020. In terms of models being used elsewhere, members were informed about a paper produced by the Isos Partnership from the Local Government Association which is looking at other models, including case studies. A copy of this paper would be circulated around members of the committee.

Resolved: That;

- i. The feedback on the information presented in the report be noted;
- ii. Information on the schools chosen for attached units be shared with the committee at a later date; and
- iii. The paper produced by the Isos Partnership from the Local Government Association be circulated around the committee.

6. Schools Causing Concerns Task and Finish Group Final Report

The Chair presented the Schools Causing Concerns Task and Finish Group Final Report to the meeting.

The report summarised the findings from the task group work which has sought to further understand what constitutes a school categorised as 'causing concern', the provision to these schools from the county council and the pressures faced by schools.

In presenting the report, the Chair gave his thanks to all members of the task group and to all the officers involved in producing the report.

Resolved: That;

- i. The report be noted; and
- ii. The recommendations of the task and finish group, as set out at Appendix 'A' of the report be supported.

7. Education Scrutiny Committee Work Programme 2019/20

Executive Summary

A single combined work programme for all of the Lancashire County Council scrutiny committees is currently being formulated. A draft copy of the work programme is set out at Appendix 'A'.

The topics included were identified at a work planning workshop for members of the Internal Scrutiny Committee held on 29 May 2020.

Recommendation

Members of both Children's Services and Education Scrutiny Committees are asked to:

- i. Suggest any additional topics for potential inclusion on the work programme.
- ii. Delegate to the Scrutiny Officers the development and delivery of this programme, identifying appropriate methods of scrutiny, in consultation with the Chairs.
- iii. Temporarily suspend the current Education and Children's Services Scrutiny Committees work programmes (2019/20) and for these to be kept under review.

Background and Advice

As a result of the Covid 19 pandemic, a decision was taken in March to suspend all council committee meetings including scrutiny until further notice. Following the introduction of new regulations and guidance on remote council meetings in April, it was confirmed that the scrutiny function would resume and that a remote work planning session for scrutiny as a whole be arranged for members of the Internal Scrutiny Committee (as the parent scrutiny committee) to receive an update on the journey so far and plans for recovery.

The Covid 19 pandemic has required members and officers to work differently and the wider context has also meant that priorities have changed or shifted in emphasis. However, scrutiny committees have an important role in reviewing how Lancashire County Council prepared for, and responded to, the Covid 19 pandemic and how the county council aims to recover and assist people and businesses across Lancashire. Therefore a single combined work programme for the foreseeable future and for all scrutiny committees is currently being formulated. A draft copy of the programme is set out at Appendix 'A'.

The work programme is a work in progress document. The topics included were identified at a work planning workshop for members of the Internal Scrutiny Committee held on 29 May 2020 and from discussions with all scrutiny chairs and deputy chairs.

A copy of the work programmes for 2019/20 is set out at Appendices 'B' and 'C'.

Methods of Scrutiny

There are several ways to investigate a topic, which include a variety of different approaches which include:

- Items to committee
- Select committee style scrutiny
- Enquiry Days
- Joint / partnership scrutiny
- Task and finish groups
- Rapporteur

However, it is important to bear in mind that regardless of the chosen method that is used for scrutiny, with a reduction in officer support to provide information, there will be a need for scrutiny members to be more proactive in gathering and using evidence.

Gathering Evidence

The Statutory Guidance on Overview and Scrutiny Committees in Local and Combined Authorities states that "Effective planning does not necessarily involve a large number of pre-meetings, the development of complex scopes or the drafting of questioning plans. It is more often about setting overall objectives and then considering what type of questions (and the way in which they are asked) can best elicit the information the committee is seeking".

This way of questioning can assist members with gathering evidence and can be used in a select committee style of scrutiny.

Other options for gathering evidence include:

- Holding focus groups or workshops or survey users of a service or people affected by a particular issue.

- Chairing discussions amongst experts – a “roundtable” exercise, bringing together local experts, this can be an action-focused way of gathering evidence;
- In-depth review of written evidence and information – this may come from a variety of different sources, which should have been identified through the scoping exercise.

Further to this, another option afforded to scrutiny is to provide a 'watching brief' on a particular subject area.

The Voice of the Public

Listening to and giving voice to the public is central to scrutiny's effectiveness.

Members of the public can bring a different perspective to any topic by speaking about their personal experiences in a way that is self-aware and reflective.

Committee members may wish to consider how the voice of the public could be included in identified topic areas to draw insights from community experiences as part of the scrutiny function going forward.

Considerations for Scrutiny Topics

Having a positive vision of what scrutiny might achieve may help to understand how it could work differently. Agreeing topics for inclusion in the work programme is about focusing and directing limited resources to maximise scrutiny's effectiveness:

- National issues will inevitably be subject to enquiries / scrutiny at a national level. ***Consider what you can influence locally.***
- Health, social care and education teams have limited resources to support O&S and non-critical work. ***How can scrutiny support those services without unnecessary extra burdens?***
- Decisions have been made in partnership through the LRF. ***How can you best look at partnership working?***
- Decisions and activities were taken to deal with an unprecedented situation. ***What general lessons can be learned from unique circumstances?***
- Recovery will not be “back to normal”. ***Can scrutiny shape the future of the county council / Lancashire?***

In addition to this, and as a tool to narrow the focus further, the following questions could be applied:

- How can scrutiny add value?
- What will have the biggest impact?
- What is the overall aim?

Children's Services Scrutiny Committee Work Programme 2019/20

The Children's Services Scrutiny Committee Work Programme details the planned activity to be undertaken over the forthcoming municipal year through scheduled Committee meetings, task group, events and through use of the 'rapporteur' model.

The items on the work programme are determined by the Committee following the work programming session at the start of the municipal year in line with the Overview and Scrutiny Committees terms of reference detailed in the County Councils Constitution. This includes provision for the rights of County Councillors to ask for any matter to be considered by the Committee or to call-in decisions.

Coordination of the work programme activity is undertaken by the Chair and Deputy Chair of all of the Scrutiny Committees to avoid potential duplication.

In addition to the terms of reference outlined in the [Constitution](#) (Part 2 Article 5) for all Overview and Scrutiny Committees, the Children's Services Scrutiny Committee will:

- Scrutinise matters relating to services for Children and Young People delivered by the authority and other relevant partners
- Review and scrutinise any matter relating to the planning, provision and operation of the health service in the area and make reports and recommendations to NHS bodies as appropriate
- Invite interested parties when reviewing any matter relating to the planning, provision and operation of the health service in the area, to comment on the matter and take account of relevant information available, particularly that provided by the Local Healthwatch
- Review and scrutinise any local services planned or provided by other agencies which contribute towards the health improvement and the reduction of health inequalities in Lancashire and to make recommendations to those agencies, as appropriate
- Take steps to reach agreement with NHS body, in the case of contested NHS proposals for substantial service changes
- Refer a matter to the relevant Secretary of State in the case of contested NHS proposals for substantial service changes where agreement cannot be reached with the NHS
- Refer to the relevant Secretary of State any NHS proposal which the Committee feels has been the subject of inadequate consultation

- Scrutinise the social care services provided or commissioned by NHS bodies exercising local authority functions under Section 31 of the Health Act 1999
- Draw up a forward programme of health scrutiny in consultation with other local authorities, NHS partners, the Local Healthwatch and other key stakeholders
- Acknowledge within 20 working days to referrals on relevant matters from the Local Healthwatch or Local Healthwatch contractor, and to keep the referrer informed of any action taken in relation to the matter
- Require the Chief Executives of local NHS bodies to attend before the Committee to answer questions, and to invite the chairs and non-executive directors of local NHS bodies to appear before the Committee to give evidence
- Invite any officer of any NHS body to attend before the Committee to answer questions or give evidence

The Work Programme will be submitted to and agreed by the Scrutiny Committees at each meeting and will be published with each agenda.

The dates are indicative of when the Children's Services Scrutiny Committee will review the item, however they may need to be rescheduled and new items added as required.
