#### 1. Welcome and Apologies for Absence

The Chair welcomed everyone to the meeting.

Apologies were received from Cllr James Flannery who was due to replace Cllr Paul Foster from South Ribble Borough Council.

It was noted that as there was no Executive Member from South Ribble Borough Council present at the meeting, the Executive Board was not quorate. Therefore, any decisions made by the Executive Board at the meeting will be ratified by written resolution after the meeting.

#### 2. Minutes of the City Deal Executive meeting held on 20 October 2021

**Resolved:** That the minutes of the City Deal Executive Board meeting held on 20 October 2021 were approved as an accurate record and signed by the Chair.

# 3. Minutes of the City Deal Stewardship Board meeting held on 20 October 2021

**Resolved:** That the minutes of the City Deal Stewardship Board meeting held on 20 October 2021 were approved as an accurate record and signed by the Chair.

#### 4. Matters Arising

It was noted that Item 8 on the minutes from the previous meeting was in relation to a Parking Levy report. It was suggested that this be looked at as part of the Lancashire 2050 work.

#### 5. Declarations of Interest

No declarations of interest were made.

#### 6. Homes England Quarterly Monitoring Progress Update Report - Q1 2022/23

Nicola Elsworth, Homes England presented a report which updated the City Deal Stewardship Board members about the progress being made at Homes England sites during Quarter 1 of the 2022/23 financial year and it was noted that strong progress had been made during the quarter.

In terms of specific updates:

- Cottam Hall was in the last phase of the development (Phase 6, Plot 15) and since the publication of the report, the work in the phase had been started.
- 51% of the homes at the Land at Eastway had been completed and discussions were ongoing with Preston City Council in relation to the Commercial Plot.
- Phase 1 at Whittingham Hospital had been completed and work on Phase 2 began earlier this year.
- A commercial deal was expected to be signed shortly at Preston East, and it was anticipated that a large receipt for the site would come in around March 2024, depending on the various planning processes.
- Whilst no loan payments were made, a grant payment of £80,169 was made to Lancashire County Council in April 2022 in relation to overage received from the buildout of land at Eastway, Preston.

The Board was also informed that South Ribble Borough Council had received a notification from the Planning Inspectorate of an 8-week delay in the planning appeal decision in relation to Pickerings Farm.

It was highlighted that the table in section 5 of the report showed a breakdown of the on-site affordable homes provision achieved across the City Deal sites. It was noted that all sites were delivering policy compliant affordable housing, except for the Whittingham site where visability issues had led to a lower level of S106 affordable homes being provided.

The City Deal Executive and Stewardship Boards thanked Karl Tupling, the Chair of the Stewardship Board, for his years of service to the City Deal and wished him luck in the future, as he would soon be retiring from Homes England.

**Resolved:** That the City Deal Stewardship Board noted the contents of the report and the progress made by Homes England during the first quarter of the 2022/23 financial year.

#### 10. Preston Western Distributor Roads Programme - Update

Phil Wilson, Central Lancashire Master Plan Delivery Manager, Lancashire County Council presented a private and confidential report which provided an update on the programme of the Preston Western Distributor Scheme.

It was noted that the progress of the work was going strong and the good weather over the summer period allowed for the work to catchup, following a previous spell of bad weather.

Officers were optimistic about the scheme completing as per programme and budget; however, it was highlighted that inflation rates for construction supplies remained high.

The Board thanked and commended the officers for their hard work in delivering the scheme during unprecedented times for the industry.

**Resolved:** That the City Deal Executive noted the current programme and financial position of the Preston Western Distributor Scheme.

#### 11. City Deal - Proposed Way Forward

Sarah Parry, City Deal Programme Manager, Lancashire County Council presented a private and confidential report on the proposed way forward for the Preston, South Ribble and Lancashire City Deal.

It was noted that in recent years, the Preston, South Ribble and Lancashire City Deal has been under review following a number of risks crystalising as highlighted in the report. Since that time, extensive work had been undertaken by the City Deal partners, including ongoing dialogue with Government, to identify options for mitigating these risks.

Therefore, a proposal was brought forward in the report which would create a funding package made up of a mix of more housing (releasing additional developer contributions), additional capital contributions and government grants, alongside a prioritised delivery programme.

It was noted that South Ribble Borough Council was awaiting further technical information from officers, in order to present a report on the proposed new City Deal to a meeting of their Full Council on 23 November 2022. The Board requested that the technical information could also be shared with the rest of the Board.

The Board was also informed that there were key issues still to work through in order to bring forward and agree a varied set of terms and operating financial arrangements.

The Board broadly agreed with the proposal, with a deadline for officers to work to on a draft varied set of terms to be considered by the South Ribble Borough Council meeting on 23 November 2022, followed by Preston City Council and Lancashire County Council Cabinets. The proposed deal should also come back to the Board meeting on a date to be arranged in December.

It was also requested that an informal meeting be held with only the Executive Board Members to discuss the way forward for the City Deal, and for this meeting to take place prior to the next meeting of the Board.

**Resolved:** That the City Deal Executive support in principle the outline proposal for a revised City Deal as set out in the report and request officers to draw up the detail and to report back to the Board for final approval.

#### **Executive Summary**

This report provides the City Deal Executive and Stewardship Board with an overview of City Deal programme level performance and project delivery. The report demonstrates that good progress continues to be made on the major live schemes, with PWD entering the final stages of its contract.

The core metrics remain consistent at the mid year stage, with a more comprehensive report on housing completions and future forecasts expected for the end of year report, when the full housing counts are completed.

It remains the case, that achievement of the full housing and commercial targets rely on an extension to the current timeframe, which is subject to agreement by the parties.

Since circulating this report in February, the City Deal Employment and Skills data has become available and added into the report, in order to complete the monitoring information for the reporting period.

#### Recommendation

The City Deal Executive and Stewardship Board are asked to note the report.

#### 1. Background and Advice

- 1.1 This report is intended to provide an overview for the City Deal Executive and Stewardship Board on project activity and programme performance. The report draws together in one place, the following updates:-
  - Preston Western Distributor Scheme Update and Social Value Outputs
  - Wider Economic and Social Value Update
  - Homes England Monitoring Report
  - City Deal Infrastructure Projects Monitoring Report



- Six Monthly Performance City Deal Core Outputs
- City Deal Employment and Skills Monitoring Report

#### 2. Preston Western Distributor (PWD) Update - Appendix 'A'

- 2.1 As previously reported, the Preston Western Distributor Scheme continues to make good progress and despite some significant challenges to the programme and cost forecasting, the scheme remains on target to complete on programme and within the approved £207.4m City Deal budget allocation.
- 2.2 The scheme is now reaching its final stages with the final earthworks season completed and works concentrating on the finishing elements including surfacing, street lighting, traffic signal installation and landscape planting.
- 2.3 The strong collaborative working that has been established between the client and contractor on this project has enabled the programme to maintain this positive position with active engagement to mitigate delays and keep costs down, being evident across the spectrum of activity in the programme.
- 2.4 Attached at appendix 'A' is a full and confidential report on the Scheme, setting out detailed cost forecasts for the Board's information.

#### PWD - Social Value Update - Appendix 'B'

- 2.5 Despite challenges posed in recent years through the pandemic and beyond, the project has delivered a wide range of social value outputs. The full contractors report is attached (Appendix 'B') and provides a detailed breakdown of performance to date.
- 2.6 In summary, at the end of year 3, the project had generated the following outputs:
  - £75m of cumulative spend has been with suppliers within 25 miles of the project.
  - 58% local labour utilisation on site
  - A total of ten apprentices have worked on the project
  - T-Level curriculum support and work placements for 11 Preston College students
  - School engagement activities delivered at Our Lady's Catholic High School
  - £30,250 in donations to local residents and organisations
  - £40,189 in charitable fundraising in total across the project
  - The project has provided opportunities for 18 ex-military members of the team
  - The project has created employment opportunities for 3 individuals categorised as not in education, employment or training (NEET)

#### 3. Economic and Social Value Update

3.1 Set out below is a progress update on project level Social Value delivery in relation to D'Urton Lane development, Harris Museum, Art Gallery and Library Project and the Preston City Centre Animate Scheme.

#### <u>D'Urton Lane Development Social Value Programme</u>

- 3.2 The Skills Hub continues to work with Wilmott Dixon and L&Q/Trafford Housing Trust, to deliver the social value programme for the D'Urton Lane development. The programme will deliver 250 new 2, 3 and 4-bedroom homes in Preston
- 3.3 To date the project has generated a wide range of positive social value outcomes for the local community including:
  - 13 new jobs created across steel fixing, joinery, labouring, gatekeeping, cleaning, document control, engineering, trainee management, groundworks and Social Value
  - 4 Kickstart positions created for Preston based NEETs
  - 141 apprentice/ trainee weeks across Quantity Surveying, Groundworks and Brickwork
  - 17 work experience weeks for Veterans, Graduates, Colleges Students & NEETs
  - 22 Construction Careers Information, Advice & Guidance sessions provided to 298 young local people, including sessions with Preston Muslim High School for Girls.
  - 2 Social Enterprises contracted as part of the project Supply Chain (Recycling Lives and Footprints)
- 3.4 The project team are working with an extensive range of local partners to realise their social value offering including Preston's College, Inspira, Preston City Council, DWP, Calico, Procure Plus and Preston Muslim High School for Girls.
- 3.5 One challenge that the team has faced is around their pledge to support a university project through the scheme. Whilst one offer was made to a student, they did not take the offer forward. The team are seeking to reengage Uclan in early 2023.
- 3.6 The team have also supported Intact Community Centre through Sensory Garden works and donations at Christmas time to support a Christmas festival.



#### Re-Imagining the Harris

- 3.7 The Harris Museum, Art Gallery and Library is currently closed for refurbishment and development works until 2024. The project will protect the building for future generations, whilst improving services and accessibility.
- 3.8 As part of the procurement for this project, Preston City Council included a social value criterion as part of the tender for the external project team. This approach supports Preston City's Council strategic aim to embed community wealth building in its work the Preston Model. Conlon Construction Ltd were appointed as the main contractor for the project and have developed a social value programme to accompany the works.
- 3.9 Social Value delivery partners include UCLan, Preston's College, Creativity Works (Preston), Community Gateway Association (Preston Vocational College), Preston Partnership, and PCC Communities Team.
- 3.10 A summary of social value commitments put in place include:
  - Secondary school level engagement via Career events
  - Undergraduate career insights events
  - Supporting built heritage and architecture Masters courses
  - Work experience opportunities
  - Internship opportunities for T-Level Students
  - Recruitment of an Apprenticeship opportunity targeting a resident
  - Promoting subcontract opportunities to Preston and Lancashire companies
  - Public workshops on heritage conservation of historic buildings
  - Tree planting
  - Fundraising activity
- 3.11 Future, detailed updates on progress have been requested and will be made available to track the impact of the scheme.

#### Animate – Cinema and Leisure Complex

- 3.12 Earlier in January 2023, works began on the £45m Animate leisure and entertainment complex scheme located in Preston City Centre.
- 3.13 Eric Wright Construction have been appointed to deliver the scheme on behalf of development partners Preston City Council and Maple Grove Developments.
- 3.14 The construction phase of the scheme will help to generate up to 200 FTE jobs, and provide opportunities for apprenticeships, work placements, and training.
- 3.15 A dedicated Animate Community Benefit Framework has been agreed to deliver social value to local residents and businesses. This approach seeks to



use local labour and supply chain, provide training, employment, volunteering opportunities and placements within local colleges, to promote environmental sustainability and to ensure that all workers are treated equally and fairly. The scheme will also provide more than 140 long term jobs when it opens to the public following a two-year construction phase.

3.16 Future updates will be provided to track progress of the schemes' social value programme and fed back to the Board.

#### 4. City Deal – Performance Monitoring Reports

#### Homes England - Quarters 2 & 3 2022/23 Monitoring Report - Appendix 'C'

- 4.1 The Homes England (HE) report attached at Appendix 'C', confirms that development has progressed well across HE sites between July 22 and December 22.
- 4.2 During this period 148 homes have completed (including 41 affordable homes) across the HE sites, bringing the cumulative total number of HE completions since the start of the Deal to 1,465 out of a potential c.4000 units.
- 4.3 On the finance side, over £24.5m has now been paid to Lancashire County Council in grant funding since the start of the Deal with around £12.3m remaining to be paid before the grant cap of £37.5m is reached.
- 4.4 The full report is attached and includes a detailed breakdown of affordable homes provision across the portfolio of sites.

#### Infrastructure Project Monitoring Update to December 2022 (Quarter 3) – Appendix D

4.5 The infrastructure monitoring schedule through to December 2022 (Quarter 3) is attached at appendix D, which sets out progress on the live projects in the programme and provides a Red/Amber/Green (RAG) status for each of the schemes. Table 1 below provides a brief snapshot of the current status of all of the schemes in the programme for quick reference.

4.6 Overall, good progress continues to be made on the major live schemes, including the PWD (detailed earlier in this report). There are a number of schemes remaining paused in the programme, pending agreement on a revised City Deal Agreement, and these are ragged red in the table to reflect this pause.

#### Year 9 – Six Monthly Performance Report (to 30<sup>th</sup> September 2022) – Core Outputs

- 4.7 Overall performance against the City Deal core metrics, is set out in the table below.
- 4.8 Whilst a number of the outputs are highlighted as amber (when assessed against the original 10 (plus 5 year run on) year timescale agreed at the outset of the Deal), it reflects the reliance on an extended term in order to achieve the full target.
- 4.9 The jobs created/safeguarded outputs are buoyed by the inclusion of letting/sales at existing premises, but it is expected that as the portfolio of new commercial development comes to fruition in the next phase of the programme, that the jobs relating to new commercial floorspace will rise significantly.

#### Employment and Skills Monitoring Report 2021/22


- 4.10 The Employment and Skills Monitoring information set out below, covers a range of City Deal employment and skills metrics for the 2021/2022 academic year.
- 4.11 The metrics were set at the start of the programme and provide indicative measures for the wider impact of the City Deal investment in the Central Lancashire area utilising data from a range of sources including National Online Manpower Information System (NOMIS), Higher Education Statistics Agency (HESA) and Education & Skills Funding Agency (ESFA).
- 4.12 Data from HESA for the 2021/22 academic year is not currently available and several of the data series have also been discontinued. Where data is not available the most recent position is displayed.






- 4.14 Apprenticeship starts for this group experienced an increase from the previous year, growing from 140 to 170 as displayed in the chart above. This represents the highest point in the time series. It also demonstrates strong recovery in demand for Apprenticeships in this sector following the pandemic.
- 4.15 Apprenticeship starts in all subjects for 16-24 year olds (excluding Construction)




- 4.15 Apprenticeship starts across all subjects amongst the 16–24-year-old group have increased year-on-year from the 2020/21 position, from 853 to 970. This is the highest level since 2018/19, however the position is lower than that seen at the highest level, in 2015/16, where numbers were 1,630.
- 4.17 The decrease in Apprenticeship starts across all subjects amongst 16–24-year-olds from 2015/16 group mirrors a national decrease in Apprenticeship numbers following Government reforms, aimed at driving up the quality of Apprenticeship provision. It also reflects a shift to a higher proportion of starts for Apprentices from age groups over the age of 24.
- 4.18 Apprenticeship starts for 16–24-year-olds in all subjects excluding construction, still stands at a higher level, when compared with the year one reference data (970 in comparison with 672).

- 4.20 Data for Job Seekers Allowance (JSA) and Universal Credit (UC) claimants is provided for the April 2022 reference period, standing at 5,830, which is higher than the baseline position of 4,803 in April 13.
- 4.21 However, the April 22 position represents a year-on-year decrease in the claimant count across the City Deal area from 8,853 in April 2021. This reflects the recovery in the labour market since the Covid-19 pandemic. The most recent data available for this measure is for January 2023 (not listed on the table) and stands at a similar level (5,805 claimants).
- 4.22 The combined claimant count for South Ribble and Preston was 5,830, representing 2.4% and 4.4% respectively for April 2022. This compares with a claimant count rate of 4.2% in Lancashire (LEP area geography) and 4.4% in the North West for the same period.



- 4.25 Data up to 2020/21 has show a year-on-year increase for this measure, equating to a 265% increase from the position in 2012/13.
- 4.26 The uplift in numbers does mirror national trends which have seen large increases in undergraduates choosing STEM subjects for their degree subjects. Increased numbers of STEM students can deliver benefits to the individual through increased earning potential, as well as wider societal and economic impacts such as increased competitiveness and addressing skills shortages required by employers.



### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Costain and their supply chain appreciate that when we undertake such a large project, it is more than building the road, it is important to provide a positive contribution to the local economy. Our aim is to maximise the value of work placed with local businesses and for local people.

To date the project spend is 163.655m

£75m of which is spent with companies within a 25 miles radius of the site.



A further **£32m** spend within 25 – 50 miles of the site £28m spend within 50 – 100 miles of the site

£15m over miles of the site (all figures rounded up)

Local to the Preston Western Distributor Road (PWDR), Roocroft Road Restraint Systems have been awarded work on the project and source the majority of their materials, labour, and transportation from the Lancashire area. Ashlea Landscaping, Shay Murtagh, and Aggregate Industries as previously mentioned in the first and second reports still source local materials and labour on the PWDR.

Costain and all supply chain companies have shared data show that an average of 58% of staff working on the project are local to the area. Since the last report, the PWDR has recruited two new labour agencies; Hercules Recruitment Ltd and NBC Site Services to provide a more diverse workforce. PSI Global and Frameworks Recruitment still remain the main labour supplies and continue to work with local organisations to promote the industry and the opportunities that are available on site for local people.

The local schools continued to suffer from the effects of the pandemic during the first six months of 2022 however the team managed to engage in a 'Future Day' and 'T-Levels Showcase Event' in two separate educational settings.

The STEM ambassadors within the team continue to enjoy the opportunity to share their career stories and offer information and advice to the next generation of young people with an interest in joining this ever-growing industry.

This report shows good progress to various Social Value activities that the team has undertaken, with many case studies from apprentices, supply chain, and those that have taken up local opportunities.

The team at PWDR continues to work hard to ensure charitable fundraising has carried on throughout the difficult times early in the year and has managed to raise a further £6,540 during 2022, making this a total £19,789 over the past 3 years. Individuals put their own time and effort into the fundraising as well as the activities themselves, and we are forever grateful for their passion and commitment to so many worthy causes. We have also donated £13,250 to local residents for their Platinum Jubilee Street Party celebrations, Preston Rotary Club and Samaritans Charity.



### PROJECT SUMMARY

We are building a major new road - the Preston Western Distributor, which will link Preston and Southern Fylde to the M55 motorway.

Scheduled to open early in 2023, this £200m road scheme is the biggest new road programme in the Preston, South Ribble and Lancashire City Deal.

It will help to promote new housing and business development in the area, while increasing capacity on the existing local road network.

The Preston Western Distributor will link the A583 and the M55 motorway and will involve the construction of:

- A new motorway junction
- Four new bridges, and
- Three underpasses


The scheme also includes two new roads connecting to new and existing housing areas of North West Preston and Cottam. The new East-West Link Road and Cottam Link Road will provide convenient access to the Preston Western Distributor, avoiding already congested local routes.

As the working age population in Lancashire is decreasing, we need to build on the sustained economic growth to keep young people in the area and bring in more skilled workers. The transport network serving Preston and the wider area is also becoming increasingly congested. We need to make sure that the road infrastructure supports our ambitious plans across North West Preston including 5,500 new homes.

Building new road capacity will:

- Provide direct access to new housing developments.
- Provide an alternative to avoid rush hour traffic in the city centre
- Improve access to the motorway from the Enterprise Zone at Warton.
- Improve our existing roads and local centres.
- Help to prioritise and promote walking and cycling.
- Support delivery of a new parkway rail station at Cottam.

#### Case study – Keelan

Keelan joined the team early in 2022 and travelled from Darwen via public transport. This meant Keelan had to take three buses each way to arrive on site by 9 am. Keelan left home each morning at 7 am to travel from Darwen to the outskirts of Preston. He then caught a bus into the town centre Preston and the number 74 bus to Sidgreaves Lane. In addition, there was a 1.2-mile walk to the PWDR site from the bus stop after a long two-hour journey.

Keelan discussed his concerns regarding the length of time it took to travel to and from work and had never considered this to be an issue with employment. Keelan had always assumed his place of work would be at least one bus journey away.

After 4 weeks on the site, Keelan had gained valuable experience of being in a workplace and the challenges/barriers he may come across during his future career in construction.

#### Costain working with UCLAN



Costain continues to support the University of Central Lancashire. Mike Hitchinson, Senior Design Manager, and Shona MacDonald, Project Manager sits on the

universities' Industry Advisory Committee for the Civil engineering degree course, which meets twice a year. The aim of the committee is to ensure the university keeps the course content current and aligned with what the industry is doing and would expect from graduates.

Costain has also presented to students on subjects such as carbon reduction in construction, structural design and analysis, and reviewing student design projects. This relationship started through our work with Lancashire County Council at Heysham and more recently the PWDR project.

Tara McCracken, Senior Environmental Adviser for Costain, working on PWDR is supporting UCLAN by providing insight into day-to-day activities for construction work for Environmental and H&S undergraduates whilst answering career questions.

NBC is a well-established multi-award-winning and accredited group that supplies labour packages in Highways, Water and Rail. For the past six months, NBC has recruited 13 operatives on the PWDR. All 13 operatives travel from the Midlands area and are from a Black, Asian, or minority community.

The company has an in-house training suite and believes that training and up-skilling are important building blocks and an integral part of business, offering qualification in City and Guilds, NVQ's, CPCS Plant Assessments, NPORS training, and behavioural-based safety training.



#### **Hercules Site Services**

Hercules are a collaborative, innovative company delivering services within the Civil Engineering sector of the construction industry. Hercules have the capability to supply skilled labour, deliver complete civils projects, hire out plant machinery and provide digital solutions for construction recruitment and workforce management. The PWDR has 8 male operatives supplied by Hercules Site Services, 4 are from a Black, Asian, minority background, 2 operatives live locally in Lancashire and 6 live within 25 miles radius.

Hercules take great pride in partnering with organisations to gain a diverse workforce and have been honoured for

outstanding support towards the Armed Forces and received the Employer Recognition Scheme Gold Award. The company are fully committed to the health and wellbeing of their workforce and provide a bespoke, fully equipped staffed Mobile Health Screening trailer that can be deployed anywhere in the country.

#### Upskilling our workforce

#### Jesse - update

Starting the PWDR as Traffic Marshall in 2020, Jesse has since completed additional NPORS traffic marshal training and gained his CPCS Dumper/Roller. Jesse has now progressed to a general foreman on site after completing the



Site Supervision Safety Training Scheme (SSSTS) in September.

#### Sunil – update



In early 2021, Sunil joined the PWDR team through Procure Plus as a traffic marshal, where he gained his CSCS card and NPORS traffic marshal qualification. Sunil has succeeded throughout the project and completed further training

Carole has worked for Walters for the last 13 years and has now worked for Walters on two Projects in Lancashire, the Preston Western Distributor Road and Heysham to M6 Link Road. What she enjoys about working in construction is the people she meets and the camaraderie she experiences within the team.

In the last 6 months, Carole has become a member of the Project SHE Committee and is enjoying this role. She enjoys being able to share her many years of experience as well as being able to explain to other members of the Project Team her perspective from 3m up in the cab of her Dump Truck. She also enjoys hearing the perspective of other members of the Project Team including those from other trades, Supervisors and Managers. She feels there is a great benefit to the Project of such meetings.

#### Andy

Andy has lived in Lancashire all his life and joined the Army at 16 years of age. Andy was originally in the Royal Electrical & Mechanical Engineers where he trained as a Mechanic. He then transferred to the Paratroopers. During his



seven years of military service, Andy served in Northern Ireland and Sierra Leone.

Andy left the Army and worked in various areas of construction including resurfacing around the UK. Approximately 5 years ago, he got his Articulated Dump Truck Ticket and started driving Dump Trucks after being recommended he tries it by a friend. With his mechanical background as part of his military training, Andy found he had the skills to identify and diagnose simple faults in the machine/s he was operating which made maintenance of his machine a lot easier.

Andy started working on the Preston Western Distributor Road in June 2022, he was employed through a local labour Agency to work for Walters completing the Earthworks on the Project. Danielle remains working on the PWDR for MSF Ltd and is coming to the end of her Business Administration Apprenticeship. Danielle will continue with MSF Ltd and enjoys her role and the team that surround her.

#### Apprentice Quantity Surveyor – Amie

Amie joined Costain at the beginning of 2022 after working on the PWDR with the supply chain, Walters. Amie completed her Quantity Surveyor Apprenticeship in September 2022 on the PWDR project and recently attended her graduation at University of Salford. She will continue her journey with Costain and join the early stages of the Lancaster Growth Catalyst Group.

## Level 6 / BEng Civil Engineering - Finlay

Finlay completed his degree apprenticeship in June 2022. Finlay remains a valuable member of the PWDR as an engineer and is supporting Reagan on-site.

### New apprenticeships on the PWDR

As the PWDR reaches its final year, the team has two new apprenticeships that will see the end of the project and welcome a new scheme in 2023. All three new apprentices have become valuable members of the PWDR team.

#### Case study - Degree Apprenticeship - George

George joined Costain and the PWDR team in September 2022 after enjoying a placement day with the team back in 2021.

After completing A-level Maths, Business Studies, Design and Technology at Ysgol Eirias Sixth Form College, George gained a place with London Metropolitan College (LMC) on the BSC (Hons) project Controls Professional Degree Apprenticeship. This is a three-year course with the first two years being work based on site. George is currently completing his first year with the PWDR planning team.



During his time on the PWDR, George maintains and updates Aphex and P6. He also spends one day per week on-site where he checks all works are being performed as planned, organises meetings, and monitors aggregate forecasts.

George's father and grandfather had careers in construction, and he felt inspired by them both to follow the same career path. He is enjoying his placement on the PWDR and has already become a valued member of the team. George would like to continue in Civil Engineering as a Planner once he gains his HNC qualification.

#### Case Study - Graduate engineer (apprenticeship) - Henry



"Before starting at Costain, I left college in 2020, then moved into manufacturing engineering at a thermoplastic company in Haydock in April 2020, which included welding, shaping cut blades on CAD, and general maintenance of the machines. I was there until June 2022 which is when I then started with Costain as a degree apprentice quantity surveyor.

At Costain, I am currently undertaking an HNC in construction and the built environment, level 4/5 at Preston college part-time for two years and then a further three years at university specialising in quantity surveying BSc.

On a daily basis, I will manage subcontract packages, forecasting, assessing their application for payments dealing with changes and contra-charges for these packages. My packages include: Site Security, drainage surveys, cleaning of drainage, temporary electrics, pedestrian guardrails, traffic management, miscellaneous metal work, and site clearance.

I also do applications for payments to the Client for the new Lancaster job and assist with the cost report and forecasting. I shadow the more experienced quantity surveyors on how they deal with the management of subcontractors and doing take-offs from both drawings and site visits.

After PWDR I am moving on to the Lancaster South Growth Catalyst.

My aspirations within Costain are to achieve senior Quantity Surveyor/ Commercial Manager and to also achieve a professional body – RICS and MCInstCE."

## Case Study Level 6 HNC Engineering – Reagan

Reagan started his career in Traffic Management before joining the PWDR team on the Community Relations team through PSI Global.

After several months, Reagan soon became interested in the engineering side of the project and began learning about the road works and structures, along with the process and the intricacies surrounding both areas. Costain provided Reagan with the opportunity to join the engineering team and offered the apprenticeship scheme after a three-month trial on site.



Reagan states 'the training and guidance on the PWDR have been so beneficial and helpful towards my development. I am first aid trained, CATG4+ trained, RD8200

trained. The guidance from other experienced engineers to help with any questions, or tips has also progressed my development. I look to carry on learning more about engineering and different types of engineering. I would like to be involved in the future on some structures or buildings or even transport engineering such as railways'.

#### Training of employees

Costain looks to develop their staff at all levels of the business and at scheme level it's important for personal development and the benefit of the company as a whole to have well trained teams. On PWDR project a number of the team are studying for long term qualifications either as apprentices or as part of their long term development within the business. 

## Local supply chain

The project is three years into the procurement strategy with significant progress toward local spending and commitments for the next year. Where national companies are awarded work, they often access materials, supplies and local labour to the project for local social value and commercial reasons.

To date the project spend is £163,655 million, of which £75 million is spent with companies within a 25 miles radius of the site. A further £32 million spent within 25 - 50 miles on the site, £28 million within 50 -100 miles and around £15 million over 100 miles from site. (all figures rounded up).

#### Road restraint systems - Rooroft

Roocroft has provided road restraint systems for Costain projects all over the UK for many





All concrete used on the PWDR is sourced from the Preston area along with general materials from local builders' merchants such as C&W Berry Ltd in Leyland. Local transportation is also used for the distribution of plant and machinery.

Roocroft's have 17 members of their team working on the PWDR, all are from the Lancashire area, with one member under 25 years old. In addition, they have subcontractors working on the PWDR, some local and some who travel to Preston and stay in local accommodation. Roocroft's had 3 apprentices in 2021/2022, all of whom have now qualified and remain working within the company.




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## Conclusion and Plans for 2023

The first half of 2022 was extremely busy on the PWDR, by summer the team started to reduce after the viaducts and bridges were structurally complete. #### 4. Finance

- 4.1. Homes England is forecasting to secure the majority of sale receipts related to the £37.5 million grant by 2023 / 24, however following a review of this position under the Homes England Business Disposal Plan (BDP) Refresh (2020 / 21 2023 / 24) some grant payments may be generated beyond this date depending on the timing of the disposal of land across Homes England's City Deal sites.
- 4.2. Whilst no loan payments were made during quarter two and three of the 2022/23 financial year, one grant payment totalling £444,053 was made in October 2022 in relation to Land at Eastway, Preston.



## 5. Affordable Housing Provision

- 5.1. The table below provides a break-down of the on-site affordable homes provision achieved across Homes England's City Deal sites.
- 5.2. All sites are delivering policy compliant levels of affordable housing, either through on-site provision or off-site contributions, except for Whittingham where viability issues have led to a lower level of \$106 affordable being provided.






## 6. Summary of Delivery


- 6.1. Several milestones and completions have been achieved during quarter two and three of the 2022 / 23 financial year including:
  - 6.1.1. A further 88 new homes completed across phases of ongoing build out at Cottam Hall;
  - 6.1.2. 19 new homes completed at Altcar Lane;
  - 6.1.3. 19 new homes completed at Croston Road North;
  - 6.1.4. 5 new homes completed at Whittingham Hospital following the start on site made in Q1;
  - 6.1.5. 4 new homes completed at Walton Park Link; and
  - 6.1.6. 13 new homes completed on land at Eastway, with a grant payment of £444,053 paid to LCC in relation to overage secured at the site.
- 6.2. Across the total new completions on Homes England's City Deal site this quarter, 41 of these have been of affordable tenures.



Of the Homes England residential City Deal sites, only Pickering's Farm is yet to achieve planning consent.



## Starts on Site




Housing starts have been claimed for 2,821 units on Homes England City Deal sites to date, out of a total 3,931 units.\*
