City Deal – Delivery and Performance Update Report

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### **Executive Summary**

This report provides the City Deal Executive and Stewardship Board with an overview of City Deal programme level performance and project delivery. The report demonstrates that good progress continues to be made on the major live schemes, with PWD entering the final stages of its contract.

The core metrics remain consistent at the mid year stage, with a more comprehensive report on housing completions and future forecasts expected for the end of year report, when the full housing counts are completed.

It remains the case, that achievement of the full housing and commercial targets rely on an extension to the current timeframe, which is subject to agreement by the parties.

Since circulating this report in February, the City Deal Employment and Skills data has become available and added into the report, in order to complete the monitoring information for the reporting period.

# 2. Preston Western Distributor (PWD) Update - Appendix 'A'

- 2.1 As previously reported, the Preston Western Distributor Scheme continues to make good progress and despite some significant challenges to the programme and cost forecasting, the scheme remains on target to complete on programme and within the approved £207.4m City Deal budget allocation.
- 2.2 The scheme is now reaching its final stages with the final earthworks season completed and works concentrating on the finishing elements including surfacing, street lighting, traffic signal installation and landscape planting.
- 2.3 The strong collaborative working that has been established between the client and contractor on this project has enabled the programme to maintain this positive position with active engagement to mitigate delays and keep costs down, being evident across the spectrum of activity in the programme.
- 2.4 Attached at appendix 'A' is a full and confidential report on the Scheme, setting out detailed cost forecasts for the Board's information.

## PWD - Social Value Update - Appendix 'B'

- 2.5 Despite challenges posed in recent years through the pandemic and beyond, the project has delivered a wide range of social value outputs. The full contractors report is attached (Appendix 'B') and provides a detailed breakdown of performance to date.
- 2.6 In summary, at the end of year 3, the project had generated the following outputs:
  - £75m of cumulative spend has been with suppliers within 25 miles of the project.
  - 58% local labour utilisation on site
  - A total of ten apprentices have worked on the project
  - T-Level curriculum support and work placements for 11 Preston College students
  - School engagement activities delivered at Our Lady's Catholic High School
  - £30,250 in donations to local residents and organisations
  - £40,189 in charitable fundraising in total across the project
  - The project has provided opportunities for 18 ex-military members of the team
  - The project has created employment opportunities for 3 individuals categorised as not in education, employment or training (NEET)

# 3. Economic and Social Value Update

3.1 Set out below is a progress update on project level Social Value delivery in relation to D'Urton Lane development, Harris Museum, Art Gallery and Library Project and the Preston City Centre Animate Scheme.

# <u>D'Urton Lane Development Social Value Programme</u>

- 3.2 The Skills Hub continues to work with Wilmott Dixon and L&Q/Trafford Housing Trust, to deliver the social value programme for the D'Urton Lane development. The programme will deliver 250 new 2, 3 and 4-bedroom homes in Preston
- 3.3 To date the project has generated a wide range of positive social value outcomes for the local community including:
  - 13 new jobs created across steel fixing, joinery, labouring, gatekeeping, cleaning, document control, engineering, trainee management, groundworks and Social Value
  - 4 Kickstart positions created for Preston based NEETs
  - 141 apprentice/ trainee weeks across Quantity Surveying, Groundworks and Brickwork
  - 17 work experience weeks for Veterans, Graduates, Colleges Students & NEETs
  - 22 Construction Careers Information, Advice & Guidance sessions provided to 298 young local people, including sessions with Preston Muslim High School for Girls.
  - 2 Social Enterprises contracted as part of the project Supply Chain (Recycling Lives and Footprints)
- 3.4 The project team are working with an extensive range of local partners to realise their social value offering including Preston's College, Inspira, Preston City Council, DWP, Calico, Procure Plus and Preston Muslim High School for Girls.
- 3.5 One challenge that the team has faced is around their pledge to support a university project through the scheme. Whilst one offer was made to a student, they did not take the offer forward. The team are seeking to reengage Uclan in early 2023.
- 3.6 The team have also supported Intact Community Centre through Sensory Garden works and donations at Christmas time to support a Christmas festival.



# Re-Imagining the Harris

- 3.7 The Harris Museum, Art Gallery and Library is currently closed for refurbishment and development works until 2024. The project will protect the building for future generations, whilst improving services and accessibility.
- 3.8 As part of the procurement for this project, Preston City Council included a social value criterion as part of the tender for the external project team. This approach supports Preston City's Council strategic aim to embed community wealth building in its work the Preston Model. Conlon Construction Ltd were appointed as the main contractor for the project and have developed a social value programme to accompany the works.
- 3.9 Social Value delivery partners include UCLan, Preston's College, Creativity Works (Preston), Community Gateway Association (Preston Vocational College), Preston Partnership, and PCC Communities Team.
- 3.10 A summary of social value commitments put in place include:
  - Secondary school level engagement via Career events
  - Undergraduate career insights events
  - Supporting built heritage and architecture Masters courses
  - Work experience opportunities
  - Internship opportunities for T-Level Students
  - Recruitment of an Apprenticeship opportunity targeting a resident
  - Promoting subcontract opportunities to Preston and Lancashire companies
  - Public workshops on heritage conservation of historic buildings
  - Tree planting
  - Fundraising activity
- 3.11 Future, detailed updates on progress have been requested and will be made available to track the impact of the scheme.

#### Animate – Cinema and Leisure Complex

- 3.12 Earlier in January 2023, works began on the £45m Animate leisure and entertainment complex scheme located in Preston City Centre.
- 3.13 Eric Wright Construction have been appointed to deliver the scheme on behalf of development partners Preston City Council and Maple Grove Developments.
- 3.14 The construction phase of the scheme will help to generate up to 200 FTE jobs, and provide opportunities for apprenticeships, work placements, and training.
- 3.15 A dedicated Animate Community Benefit Framework has been agreed to deliver social value to local residents and businesses. This approach seeks to



use local labour and supply chain, provide training, employment, volunteering opportunities and placements within local colleges, to promote environmental sustainability and to ensure that all workers are treated equally and fairly. The scheme will also provide more than 140 long term jobs when it opens to the public following a two-year construction phase.

3.16 Future updates will be provided to track progress of the schemes' social value programme and fed back to the Board.

# 4. City Deal - Performance Monitoring Reports

Homes England - Quarters 2 & 3 2022/23 Monitoring Report - Appendix 'C'

- 4.1 The Homes England (HE) report attached at Appendix 'C', confirms that development has progressed well across HE sites between July 22 and December 22.
- 4.2 During this period 148 homes have completed (including 41 affordable homes) across the HE sites, bringing the cumulative total number of HE completions since the start of the Deal to 1,465 out of a potential c.4000 units.
- 4.3 On the finance side, over £24.5m has now been paid to Lancashire County Council in grant funding since the start of the Deal with around £12.3m remaining to be paid before the grant cap of £37.5m is reached.
- 4.4 The full report is attached and includes a detailed breakdown of affordable homes provision across the portfolio of sites.

#### Infrastructure Project Monitoring Update to December 2022 (Quarter 3) – Appendix D

4.5 The infrastructure monitoring schedule through to December 2022 (Quarter 3) is attached at appendix D, which sets out progress on the live projects in the programme and provides a Red/Amber/Green (RAG) status for each of the schemes. Table 1 below provides a brief snapshot of the current status of all of the schemes in the programme for quick reference.

4.6 Overall, good progress continues to be made on the major live schemes, including the PWD (detailed earlier in this report). There are a number of schemes remaining paused in the programme, pending agreement on a revised City Deal Agreement, and these are ragged red in the table to reflect this pause.

# <u>Year 9 – Six Monthly Performance Report (to 30<sup>th</sup> September 2022) – Core Outputs</u>

- 4.7 Overall performance against the City Deal core metrics, is set out in the table below.
- 4.8 Whilst a number of the outputs are highlighted as amber (when assessed against the original 10 (plus 5 year run on) year timescale agreed at the outset of the Deal), it reflects the reliance on an extended term in order to achieve the full target.
- 4.9 The jobs created/safeguarded outputs are buoyed by the inclusion of letting/sales at existing premises, but it is expected that as the portfolio of new commercial development comes to fruition in the next phase of the programme, that the jobs relating to new commercial floorspace will rise significantly.

# Employment and Skills Monitoring Report 2021/22


- 4.10 The Employment and Skills Monitoring information set out below, covers a range of City Deal employment and skills metrics for the 2021/2022 academic year.
- 4.11 The metrics were set at the start of the programme and provide indicative measures for the wider impact of the City Deal investment in the Central Lancashire area utilising data from a range of sources including National Online Manpower Information System (NOMIS), Higher Education Statistics Agency (HESA) and Education & Skills Funding Agency (ESFA).
- 4.12 Data from HESA for the 2021/22 academic year is not currently available and several of the data series have also been discontinued. Where data is not available the most recent position is displayed.

4.13 Apprenticeship starts for 16-24 year olds in Construction






- 4.14 Apprenticeship starts for this group experienced an increase from the previous year, growing from 140 to 170 as displayed in the chart above. This represents the highest point in the time series. It also demonstrates strong recovery in demand for Apprenticeships in this sector following the pandemic.
- 4.15 Apprenticeship starts in all subjects for 16-24 year olds (excluding Construction)




- 4.15 Apprenticeship starts across all subjects amongst the 16–24-year-old group have increased year-on-year from the 2020/21 position, from 853 to 970. This is the highest level since 2018/19, however the position is lower than that seen at the highest level, in 2015/16, where numbers were 1,630.
- 4.17 The decrease in Apprenticeship starts across all subjects amongst 16–24-year-olds from 2015/16 group mirrors a national decrease in Apprenticeship numbers following Government reforms, aimed at driving up the quality of Apprenticeship provision. It also reflects a shift to a higher proportion of starts for Apprentices from age groups over the age of 24.
- 4.18 Apprenticeship starts for 16–24-year-olds in all subjects excluding construction, still stands at a higher level, when compared with the year one reference data (970 in comparison with 672).
- 4.19 Job Seekers Allowance (JSA) and Universal Credit (UC) claimants

- 4.20 Data for Job Seekers Allowance (JSA) and Universal Credit (UC) claimants is provided for the April 2022 reference period, standing at 5,830, which is higher than the baseline position of 4,803 in April 13.
- 4.21 However, the April 22 position represents a year-on-year decrease in the claimant count across the City Deal area from 8,853 in April 2021. This reflects the recovery in the labour market since the Covid-19 pandemic. The most recent data available for this measure is for January 2023 (not listed on the table) and stands at a similar level (5,805 claimants).
- 4.22 The combined claimant count for South Ribble and Preston was 5,830, representing 2.4% and 4.4% respectively for April 2022. This compares with a claimant count rate of 4.2% in Lancashire (LEP area geography) and 4.4% in the North West for the same period.



- 4.25 Data up to 2020/21 has show a year-on-year increase for this measure, equating to a 265% increase from the position in 2012/13.
- 4.26 The uplift in numbers does mirror national trends which have seen large increases in undergraduates choosing STEM subjects for their degree subjects. Increased numbers of STEM students can deliver benefits to the individual through increased earning potential, as well as wider societal and economic impacts such as increased competitiveness and addressing skills shortages required by employers.
