

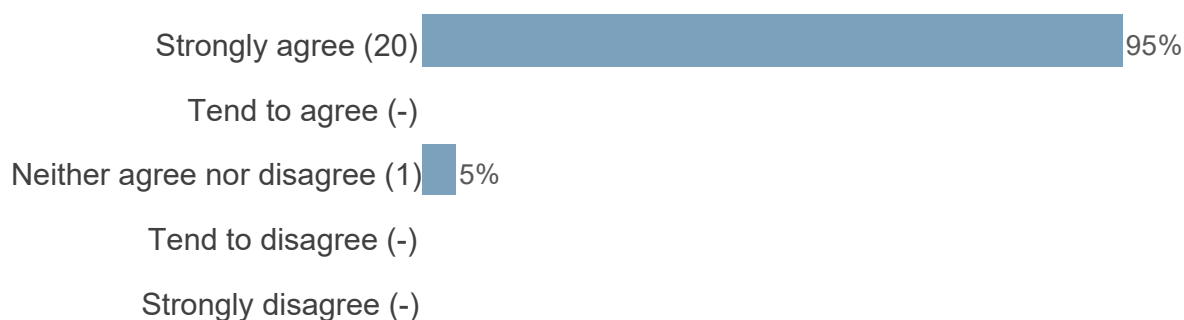
St Joseph's Roman Catholic Primary Consultation - June 2024

We are proposing to create an SEN unit which will be part of St Joseph's Catholic Primary School to support up to sixteen children with social communication and interaction needs.

An SEN unit will allow children with SEND, who are currently at St Joseph's, to stay and experience all of the community, socialising and extra-curricular opportunity that comes with being part of a mainstream primary but also the specialist support in their wider achievement and progress.

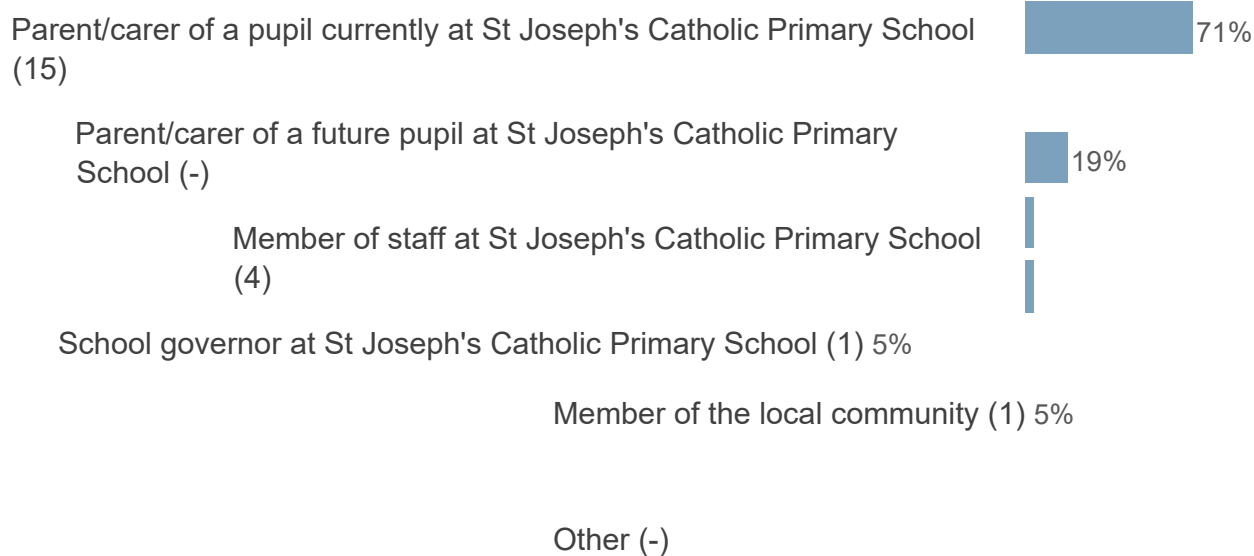
My children attend the school [REDACTED], it is a fantastic, nurturing school and it would be an amazing SEN unit.

Sen is a massive issue for a lot of children, this unit will support children who dont need to attend a special needs school but need extra support in main stream school to help them achieve their full potential

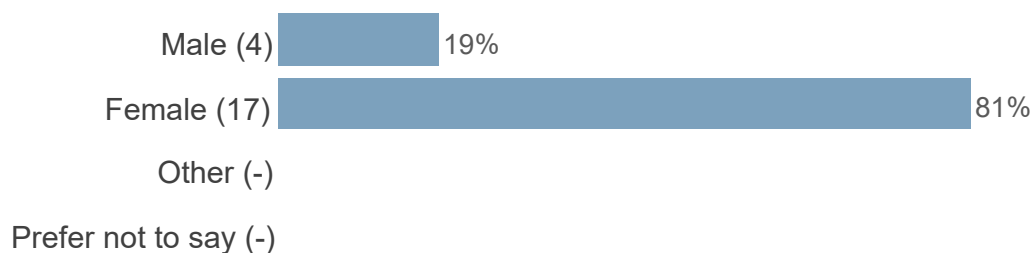

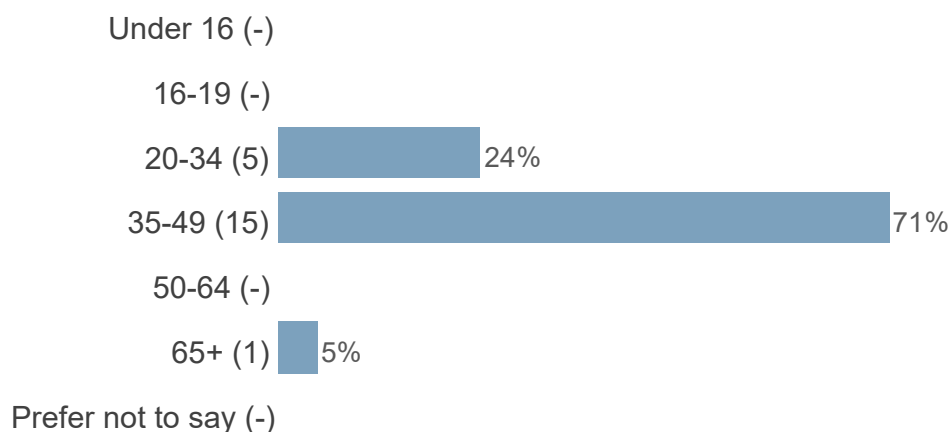

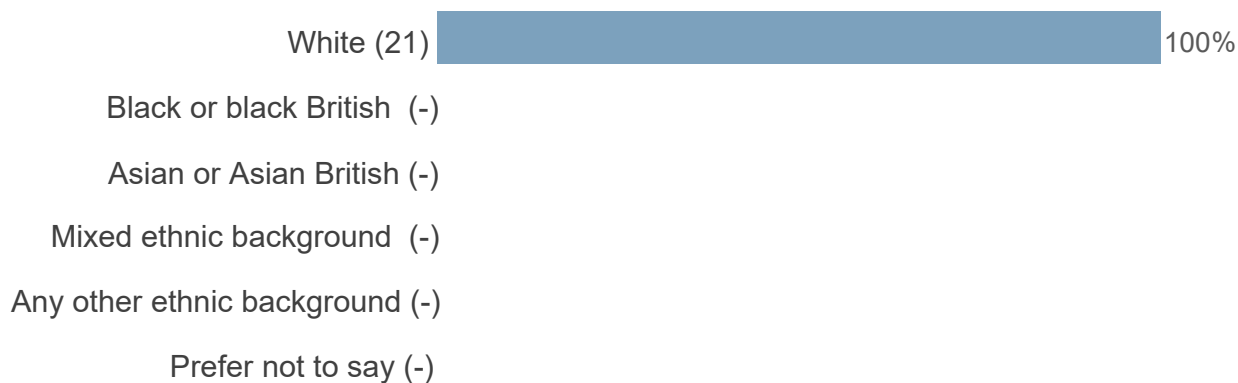
What was your age on your last birthday?
